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## **My Music Or Yours**

reg Haynes, author of the acclaimed Heeey Baby Days Of Beach Music, and Marion
Carter and Julian Fowler of Ripete Records have teamed together to release an additional twelve CD's to follow-up to the two that accompa-

nied the book.
Sure, I now what
you're thinking.
Bubblegum! However, I call it classics. I call it roots.
I call it history. As



Fessa John Hook proclaimed, there are a number of stages in the development of what we call Beach Music. This book is a history of the second stage and beyond; just as the CD releases are a musical history these great eras. Enough soap boxing! But I am here to tell you about music ... some great music from some great, sometimes overlooked or forgotten, artists, as well as some with whom you are most familiar. The bulk of the songs on this collection never found their way to LP's, much less CD's. So each of these discs will one day become collectors' items for sure.

Each disc contains some 20 songs. Volume 3 begins with The Appreciations' No No No. The group launched

their career by winning a talent contest at John C. Smith University in Charlotte. They were initially promoted by Charlotte radio personality, "Chattie" Hattie



Leeper, but later signed on with producers,

Willie Mitchell and Phil Medley. Greenville, South Carolina native Moses Dillard is included in the volume with I'll Pay The Price. You remember Gene Pharr for his Tribute To Billy Stewart. He is also on the compilation with More Than I Can Stand. Dave Bupp, of The Magnificent Men, resurfaced in 1996 to be included on the collection with It's All Over. General Johnson and The Showmen's Take It Baby was one of their initial recordings with Swan Records after departing from Minit. Bill Bradley's Spirit Records recording artist Sonja Grier finalizes Volume 3 with Right Here Right Now. I've only highlighted just a few of the twenty songs, but now let's move on to Volume 4.

Volume 4 has some strong material on it, including The Monzas' megahit, Hev I Know You, Bob Meyer & The Rivieras' Behold and Billy Scott's The Georgia Prophets' For The First Time, as well as another from Moses Dillard & The Dynamic Showmen, Pretty As A Picture. In recent years, Cornell Blakely has made a name for himself with his Little Mountain radio station, WKMG. Years prior, he made a name for himself as a recording artist, while working for Motown's Berry Gordy, Jr. Cornell's You Ain't Gonna Find is considered one of Gordy's all time best productions. Harry Deal & The Galaxies join in on 04 with I Still Love You, and The Magnificent Men are back with I'll Always Love You. This volume also includes the previously unreleased song, Gonna Be Sweet To You by Linda Hawley that was recorded at the same time as her 1982 hit. Use Your Head.

The classics on Volume 5 include Ron Moody & The Centaurs' 1969

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national hit, If I Didn't have A Dime, as well The Entertainers' Hot On A Thang, The Fantastic Shakers' Nobody But You and The Swingin' Medallions' She Drives Me Out Of My Mind, their 1966 charted follow-up to their high rated Double Shot (Of My Baby's Love). This collection also includes The Delecardoss' She's The One I Love and a couple of obscure ones, Just Another Heartache by Little Richie and What Goes Up Must Come Down by The Charms Unlimited, a Columbia, South Carolina group. Volume 6 includes work by Roy Smith with For The Love Of Her, who wrote I Got The Fever for The Georgia Prophets. The Entertainers are also on this one with Any Way You Want It, as is The Rickey Godfrey Band with She's The One I Love. You will also want to take note of The Valentines' If You Love Me and Gene & The Teenbeats' 1966 version of Wade Flemons' Here I Stand.

You will recognize In Paradise by The Showmen, and perhaps When by Joe Simon, both of which are selections of Volume 7. You will want to give special attention to The In Men Ltd.'s People.

Roy Smith is back on this volume with the band, Magic, singing Pretty Girl, as is Cornell Blakely with You Broke My Heart. If you don't have The Kruze Band's Shoo



Doo Fu Fu Ooh and W.J. Moore & The Dynamic Upsetters' Shame Shame Shame on 45's, now is your chance to get these two rarities on Volume 8. Here are a couple of others on this CD that you won't find anywhere else ... So Young And So Innocent by Calvin Lindsey & The Hysterics and Every Man Needs by The Pallbearers. Gene Barber's I Dig You Baby and Willie Tee's classic, Teasin' You are also on this collection.

Volume 9 carries an array of songs of interest, including Willie Tee's obscure Please Don't Go, Billy Scott & The Georgia Prophets' Nobody Loves Me Like You Do. Bob Collins & The Fabulous Five's rendition of If I Didn't Have A Dime and Jewell & The Rubies' classic. Kidnapper. By the way, you do know that If I Didn't Have A Dime was initially recorded by Gene Pitney? On 9, you will be introduced to Just Like The Weather by Nolan Chance, who was formerly with Gene Chandler's Dukays. You will, too, find interest in The Rhythm Masters' Talking About My Baby and Lil' Bob & The Lollipops' I Got Loaded, as well as Cornell Blakely's I Got That Feeling. You will also find on this disc Come Back Girl by The Pieces Of Eight. I always thought that Steve Caldwell and Brent Fortson started The Pieces Of Eight after they left The Swingin' Medallions, and they did have a lot of musical influence on this Waycross, Georgia band. The Pieces Of Eight and The Swingin' Medallions are back to back on Volume 10 of the Heeey Baby Days extended collection with It Will Stand and I Want To Be Your Guy respectively. After The Georgia Prophets split, Billy Scott formed Three

Prophets and released So Glad It Happened To Me, which is included in this tenth volume of The Music. Also, Gene Barbour & The Cavaliers' hit, Nobody, was added to the volume, as was The Showmen's Our Love Will Grow. An interesting cut on this volume is Something You Got by The Sardams from Wilson, North Carolina. They derived their name from 'madras' spelled backwards, which was very popular attire of the sixties and seventies.

Ron Henderson & Choice of Colour open Volume 11 with Your Love. Roger Branch of The Tempests and music legend Allen Toussaint produced this one. Other obscurities on the disk include works by The Chasers (Without My Girl), The Gants (Roadrunner) and Wilbur Walton & The James Gang (Right String

Wrong Yovo). The latter, Dothan, Alabama group does a superb job with Dr. Feelgood (Willie "Piano Red" Perryman) & The Interns' classic party song. A few that



you will recognize on 11, some of which are pretty hard to come by, are Don't You Think It's Time by The (Georgia) Prophets, Baby For You by Arthur Alexander, You Must Be A Miracle by Second Nature and a live version of The Tams Medley. Volume 12 begins strong with a rarity from The Three Prophets (Billy and Barbara Scott and Janet Helm), I Think I Really

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Love You. Other obscure songs you will find on this one are Love Doesn't Pay by The Attractions, recorded in 1968, She's Got It All Together by Harry Deal & The Galaxies, You'll Lose A Good Thing by Kip Anderson with Moses Dillard, Beautiful Things For You by Cortez Greer & The Lifters and Strange Things Are Happening by The Pieces of Eight. You will also want to take a listen to Beaufort, South Carolina's Melody Makers' Walking Up A One Way Street and Burlington, North Carolina's Weejuns' Where Have You Been.

J.D. Cash is a part of Volume 13 with his Fifty-Fifty, and The Magnificent Men with Since I Lost My Baby. Ron Henderson & Choice of Colour with Love Is Gone and Kip Anderson with Moses Dillard with I'm Out Of Love are once again a part of this disk. David Brinston is also a part of 13 with his smash hit, Hit And Run, as are The Esquires, who gave us Get On Up, with Listen To Me. Bob Kuban & The In Men, who gave us The Cheater, are on this compilation with Stop Her On Sight (S.O.S.), and one of Pittsburgh's favorite groups, Pure Gold, come on strong with Just Because. South Carolina band, The Caravelles, do a fine job with their rendition of The Manhattens classic I Wanna Be Your Everything. This Caravelles group, not to be confused with the North Carolina group, with none other than Tommie James, backed many groups in concert on the Clemson campus. Volume 14 brings back Willie Tee with his popular Walking Up A One Way Street for the old music lovers and gives us Dobie Gray's Soul Days for the new music lovers. King Arthur Epps slows it down with

I'm Not Giving You Up, and The Valentines smooth it out with Got To Get Yourself Together. Johnny Cobb is a part of this disk with Pretty As A Picture, and the legendary Nomads are included with All My Life. Here are a few that were new to me ... My Carolina Girl by Admiral Ice, In The Beginning by Prince Paul & The Swingin' Imperials and It's Got To Be Mellow by C.C. & The Souls. C.C. is actually Chuck Cockerham. He later joined Bill Pinkney's Original Drifters and has been a mainstay with Bill's Drifters for over thirty years.

I have only touched on a little, those of which I feel may be the highlights in each volume; those that are made for dancing or listening pleasures. There are many more great artists on each of the releases. Each CD package contains information of each of the artists, which is really some valuable information. An enormous amount of time has gone into researching the music and the artists behind the music.
